SURVEY PROTOCOL

SPEAK WITH THE CAMPGROUND OWNER

- Introduce the topic of invasive tree pests and what threat they pose to Vermont and to the campground.
- Offer outreach materials (posters, rack cards) to display.
- Ask for permission to survey the campground's trees for tree pest infestations.

ORIENT YOURSELF TO THE LAYOUT OF THE CAMPGROUND

- Identify locations where firewood is stored and burned. (e.g. campsites)
- Look over the general health of EAB and ALB host trees at the campground, looking for ones that seem to be in decline.

SELECT UP TO 20 TO TREES SURVEY IN DETAIL:

PRIORITIZE TREES THAT ARE

- EAB or ALB host trees, (if needed, see signs/symptoms sheets to review)
- Near areas where firewood is used/stored
- Showing symptoms of pest activity or decline
- Survey trees
 - Use binoculars to examine the entire tree from the medium sized top-most branches, down to the trunk.
 - Walk around the tree to examine the tree from all four sides
 - Note any signs or symptoms of EAB or ALB
 - If no suspect signs or symptoms are observed, record a tally mark for the tree and move on to the next tree.
- If suspect signs or symptoms are observed:
 - Record data on the data sheet. Make sure to include enough information so that the tree can be relocated.
 - Take a picture. If you can collect a sample of loose bark with galleries, insect specimens, or other suspect material, put it in a tightly sealed plastic bag, labelled with the suspect tree number.
 - Inform the campground owner of the observation and that a report will be made.
- Reporting:
 - If you find suspect trees, submit your report at VTinvasives.org's "Report It".
 - If no suspect trees are observed, mail your data sheet to Gwen Kozlowski at 655 Spear St; Burlington, VT 05405.
